Opening Ceremony

The opening ceremony started Roses 2024 with a bang, with a volleyball tournament that led to a Lancaster win.

The sold-out sports hall was decked in lights and guests were welcomed with a DJ set from Mystikle Blue, who kept the crowd's mood up as they waited for the game to begin. Lancaster University's Hip-Hop and Breakdance Society introduced the game, with a fast-paced routine to an energetic pop mashup.

Speakers from the two universities spoke to the crowd, highlighting the game's long history. Richard Sope, Vice Chair of the Trustee Board, spoke about the "identity through shared experiences" gained through the tournament and his pride in Lancaster was evident when he mentioned the University's union-sponsored "superb sports facilities" where the tournament took place. The Vice Chancellor of Lancaster then spoke about the friendly rivalry between the two Universities, which was felt throughout the room.

Kiran Trehan, Pro-Vice-Chancellor at York and Lancaster alumni, then spoke about how she felt "this country [was] in safe hands with people like you". York's own Sports Officer Tanisha Jain (TJ). led the York supporters in a 'Yorkshireeeee' chant, before Jack Watson, the Lancaster Student Union Sport Vice President, affirmed that Roses were Red.

The long-awaited men's vollevball game then began. York's team was welcomed by the whiteclad supporters and Lancaster's team were greeted with minutes of applause. After a quick lighting change, some handshakes, and a word with the referee, the game

Lancaster started with a strong lead, with York hitting it out, but the two teams were soon close together. York got a foul for contact, while some of Lancaster's strong hits to the ground were not defended by the team. After some brief pep talks, York came back fighting, raising their score from 21 - 15 to 21 - 17. York worked well together, volleying the ball between the three

of them, but this wasn't enough to save the point from Lancaster, who pulled ahead with 24-17. With some very lively crowd support, and Lancaster co-opting the 'Yorkshire' chant to a rather unpleasant version, Lancaster won the first set

The second fifth commenced with a strong start with both teams tying at 1-1. Lancaster served the ball into the net several times, letting York pull ahead. After Lancaster gained a point, leading to strong cheering from their supporters, York's Sam (number 25) smashed it to the ground, with Lancaster unable to return it. The ball then started to flip-flop between teams, with Lancaster gaining the point and starting to pull into the lead. After a few more serves into the net from both teams, York's Sam was diving for the ball, desperately trying to get it back up, but these efforts were unfortunately futile, with Lancaster gaining the point. Despite strong attacks and defences from York, Lancaster's lead started

Lancaster's captain, Konstan-

tinos (Costas) Charalambous (8) then got served with a yellow card for screening. For non-volleyball players, this is when someone intentionally obscures the receiving player's view of the server or ball. After this, York began to gain on Lancaster, with great teamwork between the players who stopped Lancaster's defence and frequent dives for the ball. After raising their points to 21-15, Lancaster began a strong comeback to the sound of the "Let's go Lads/Lancs" chant from their supporters. After several more smashes to the ground and serves from York into the net, Lancaster took the second fifth, with a score of 25-17 and a standing ova-

The tense third fifth began: if Lancaster won this game, it would be game over for York. York started off strong, winning the first point, but Lancaster was quick to catch up and it was clear that the two teams were both fighting to win. York began to maintain a small lead, with the score at 5-7 and rising for York, as Lancaster slipped across the court and their number

4's dives were not enough to defend against York.

At 9-13, Lancaster began to speed up, with some strong volleys not being returned by York, despite players trying to pancake the ball up. Lancaster's point momentum built up, but the pass went straight into the net, despite the chanting, which gave York hope. At 22-18, York was attacking, with Lancaster hitting the ball into the stands, and number 22 down on the floor trying to save their score. At 22-21, York hit the ball out, and Lancaster took the opportunity. In front of a sea of red, and despite the very strong York defence, at 24-23, York was unable to return a Lancaster ball, and Lancaster won the match at 25-23.

Speaking to York Captain Ethan Fenton, he said he was "annoved we didn't win, but [was] proud of the boys." He thanked the York fans who turned up to see them play despite the "good show" that the Lancaster fans put on.

Football Honours Even on Roses' Opening Day

Friday saw a victory apiece for Lancaster and York, with some enthralling football played by both sides.

The first fixture of the two, York University's Uni Football 3s against Lancaster's College Select side, effectively the best players their colleges have to offer, ended in a 2-3 victory for York. Having spoken to two of the York footballers beforehand, it was clear that the York side were buzzing for the upcoming game.

Kicking off at 10.30, the match was alive as the two sides, both similarly lined up in a 4-3-3 formation, constantly pressed and counter pressed for the ball, playing direct passes into the danger zones in an end-to-end game. The first twenty minutes was characterised by Lancaster's attacking threat, culminating in a crisp free kick forcing a brilliant save from the York keeper in the top left corner, but they could not capitalise.

York seized on the opportunity. A scramble in the box from a set piece led to York forcing it in the net, and shortly after a cutting ball through the defence and a composed finish from the striker made it 0-2 York.

However, Lancaster refused to give in. A headed goal from a corner seized a goal back for the home side, and another corner goal from Lancaster centre forward Dempsey completed the comeback to make it 2-2. The game was boiling over, as shown by the five yellow cards for York and single yellow for Lancaster by the 53rd minute, but it seemed a goal was in one side's future.

Energised by a couple of substitutions, York pushed for a goal that came in the form of a penalty deep into the second half. Converted by York number 10 Alex Mo, he was quick to run over and celebrate in front of the Lancaster fans — much to their dismay.

With the 2-3 scoreline secured and the game won, the crowd were left entertained, even if not especially pleased.

An hour and a half after full time came Halifax 2s, representing York, against Fylde 2s. As the weather got worse, the football didn't, and goal after goal saw Fylde take complete control of the game by the early second half with four goals to Halifax's nil. Halifax heads refused to drop though, and they managed to salvage hopes by scoring two. But this proved to be futile at full time, by which point Fylde had added two goals to end the game 6-2 to the home side. While the football still retained its quality, the sideline really iced the

chants flew between the opposing supports, making the fixture a fiery encounter but light-hearted.

Of the two fixtures, I found the 10:30 game to be the better of the two encounters. Mo winding up the Lancaster fans by celebrating in front of them, tackles flying in and the referee struggling to keep a lid on it, as well as exquisite football played on a state of the art pitch.

It made every minute worth watching.

With a game won by each university, they have both won a point in the race to Roses glory. Friday certainly set the standard for a weekend of top notch university football.

Lancaster Clutch win After Back-and-Forth Game of Ultimate

Despite York taking a strong lead at the start, Lancaster won the MixOutdoor Ultimate 14-13.

More commonly known by the brand name Frisbee, Ultimate sees two teams of seven try to score by catching the disc in the 'endzone' on the far side of the pitch.

The game started quickly with York winning the first point after just a few seconds. Both teams were on equal footing, with Lancaster's women having won 13-10 and York taking the Open category 14-10 earlier in the day. However, this fixture was not worth any points for the Roses tally.

Lancaster's Tom Jackson and Alex Niouma, both undefeated in the past two years of Roses, scored their first point with lots of backand-forth play. Niouma later went on to attempt a long, high and slow throw up the pitch, but the disc was caught by Rebekah Sparks for York

York then went 5-1 up after making some brilliant interceptions, including a point scored by Oliver Hart.

After a 15-minute interval to reorganise, play resumed with supporters chanting for York. Play was then more even as Lancaster closed

the gap to equalise 40 minutes in at 6-6. Jackson made some brilliant interplay passes with teammates, some of which led to some points for Lancaster.

York soon appeared to be edging into the lead, reaching 13-9 just over an hour into the game including a short pass to Hannah Wilson who caught with a roll in the endzone.

Lancaster then quickly scored 4 points to equalise again, with much of the success again coming from the deadly duo Jackson and Niouma. The game was level until 13-13, before play was distracted by American Football players arriving for a later match. Lancaster snatched the last point to win 14-13, 95 minutes after the game started.

After the match, Daisy Todd-McIntyre and Joseph Hurley from York said "we came in hotter than Lancaster, but both their offence and defence got better as the game went on". They remarked that the game was a lot closer than last year, and said that for the upcoming indoor fixtures on Saturday, "everyone is feeling energised as it could go either way."

LANCASTER 37 YORK 26 Lancaster Capitalise on Half-Time Capitalation

Instantly recognisable by their stature and presence, the American footballers of each team occupied the sideline, sporting their respective red and white jerseys. Before play could begin, each player was called forward onto the field through a guard of honour celebrating the dedication of each player to reach Roses itself.

Upon the coin toss, the York Centurions opted to receive the ball first, which instantly hushed the home crowd. To ease any immediate tension, the Centurions began by operating the run game, which proved immediately unsuccessful, resulting in a punt on the opening drive. To a large ovation from the crowd, the Lancaster Bombers adorned the field, using their first possession to gain around 20 yards of ground before being held by the Centurions, also opting to punt away the ball.

The fixture started defensively; it was not until the third possession from each team that the first score was placed upon the board, with Matt Hill of the York Centurions making the score 6-0. York displayed their aggressive intent

immediately, opting for a 2 point conversion, which was completed to make the score 8-o. After another stifled drive by the Bombers offence, the Centurions regained possession. This, however, would result in a moment which reinvigorated the home crowd, with Tom Fanthorpe throwing an interception to Lancaster defensive back Gergely Tamas, undoubtedly the player of the game, whos carried the ball up most of the pitch to the offensive end zone for Lancaster's first touchdown?

With the scores level at 8-6, play was halted with the operation of a drone above the pitch by a spectator. With the drone safely moved over 20 metres to the Women's football pitch adjacent, play could begin again, with the Bombers immediately gaining their first lead of the fixture with a field goal from 35 yards, making scores 9-8. Two more long delays were taken in the first half, both due to serious injuries for each side, acting as a reminder for the aggressive physical nature of the contest at play. After a touchdown each, the teams went to half time with Lancaster leading

Following the half time break, the hostility of the home crowd continued to grow, with York's warmups met with jeers and chants. To the delight of the crowd, Lancaster began the second half extremely strongly, scoring a touchdown from 40 yards and converting the extra two points to extend their lead to 23-14. This domineering performance only continued, with Lancaster performing the recovery off an onside kick to immediately regain possession. The resulting touchdown all but sealed the game for Lancaster, with the fixture dragging to its eventual score of 37-26.

Lancaster's celebrations were wild and dominated by red smoke, as has become tradition, but we were able to catch up with Theodore Pritchard, a linebacker for the victorious side, who told us victory felt "pretty good" and had been "a long time coming", pointing out that it meant a 'three-peat' for the home side. When asked what had caused the shift in momentum at half-time, he said "they got tired, we kept the energy up".

In a heated and focused battle, the University of York clashed against Lancaster University in a gripping Open 1st Pool tournament during Roses 2024, with Lancaster holding a commanding lead for much of the match. Anticipation ran high as York sought to turn the tide in their favour, but to no avail.

The tournament unfolded simultaneously on two tables, infusing the atmosphere with a sense of bustling activity, and the presence of suited referees imparted a sense of nobility. Loud music emanated from the commentating table, adding to the energetic ambience of the audience which was extremely cheerful, despite the intensity, many of them clutching freshly tapped beers in hand among other refreshments.

ing position. However, despite their efforts, the momentum remained firmly in Lancaster's hands. With each frame, they extended their lead, showcasing a dominance that left their opponents struggling to keep pace as Lancaster marched towards victory.

In the finale, Lancaster University ended triumphantly with a resounding 9-0 victory, their dominance echoing throughout the venue. Despite the disappointment of defeat, the spirit of both the players and the audience showed healthy competition, mutual support and sportsmanship.

We had the opportunity to ask one of the York players, Tommy George, who told Vision 'I enjoyed it until he lost,' about his feelings freshly after the tournament: 'Everyone played really well, it's a tough opposition to go against, cause they're one of the best pool teams across the country.'



After an intense qualifier in the morning, we were left with some very strong finalists who put up incredible performances, and the very small space of the climbing wall had an electric atmosphere from both climbers and spectators. With the help of women's finalist Olivia Mullan who provided me with a technical perspective, here's a rundown of the final four climbers and their performances.

First on the wall was LUMC's Tom Waddy, described as a "classic lead climber if there ever was one", and his technique was clear throughout. Tom kicked off the finals with a very strong start for Lancaster and his second climb was just as smooth, overall an impressive lead performance from a fairly new climber to the university competition scene.

Next up, climbing for York, was Theo Hill, another extremely talented climber and very possibly the crowd favourite, especially when his Rose's shirt came flying at the crowd before his second climb. Just missing out on topping either of his climbs (slipping on the final hold of his first climb, much to the vocal LANCASTER 2 YORK 3

The room was packed long before the event started. Spectators poured out of the bleachers and into the aisles; wherever there was room, people sat cross-legged with cardboard signs.

Even their "warm-ups" looked intense. Girls were being thrown up in the air left and right.

There are ten competing teams overall, all at different levels. Each team performs in pairs against each other based on level. To win, you need to win an overall number of teams

York Pom vs Lancaster Pom:

York Pom kicked things off with an energetic, explosive number to get things going. They spun like tots and their occasional mid-routine yells set the crowd into a frenzy. Their use of the floor was also quite unique, if not a bit chaotic at times

Lancaster Pom performed exceptionally well to a pop medley playlist, and they received a much louder cheer at the end. Their jumps stood out as being really high. But it looked as if one of the dancers had a leg injury.

York Lyrical

Next up was a gorgeous, lyrical routine, which gave us a refreshing break from the explosive energy of cheer numbers. You could hear a pin drop during this number. Switching up from the usual yellow and black outfits, seven dancers came out in purple dresses. Their arm movement was softer than anything we'd seen so far, but they brought back all the power when doing their kicks.

Bringing back the pom-poms! They used the space a lot and moved to each corner of the floor (not actually competing)

Lancaster - Very smiley and had several lifts going on at the same time on stage. They were cartwheeling all over the stage. Their lifts weren't always synchronised but they were always energetic and smiling

York - Lots of different things were going on at once (so much to look at). You could tell they were all having fun and they drove home the energy at the end. The last eight counts especially were full of energy and they really brought it home at the end

Level 2 Category:

York - They mixed up the spacing of the lifts which was interesting to see but one of them didn't quite work (one of the girls didn't get up in time) They made up for this with their sassy poses on top of the lifts. There were some cool sections with different musical styles which really made the routine pop

Lancaster - Started dynamically right from the start. Really steady on the lifts and they managed to get into their lifts quickly. There was a lot of good interaction between the

lifted dancers, as they held each other's hands in the air.

York Hip Hop - Wearing red and black jackets, split into two different groups on stage, very in unison and sassy number

Closing Numbers:

York - They came out with a really fierce number and they even threw the pompoms down mid-routine to add a dramatic flare. They managed to hold the lifts for a long amount of time, showing they were clearly confident being in the air. They threw out all their best tricks, turns and smiles at the audience.

Lancaster - Starting with a notso-smooth transition (tec couldn't find their music for a few minutes), they came out really strong.

They did cool kicks in the air and they definitely went out with a bang. Strong level of concentration on their face and a great feature lift where all the dancers

Vision spoke to Emma Newport, Vice President of York Cheer, who competed in the opening number who said:

Next up was another YUMC climber, Matty Grier. Now I may seem biased as a member of YUMC in saying that Matty is one of the most spectacular climbers I have ever witnessed scale a wall, but his confident flash of both his final

routes as well as his clean sweep in qualifiers proves this point nicely. Matty has a great consistency to his climbing, putting up as impressive a performance in Lancaster as he did at York last year, which really makes him stand out at every lead event.

And last to hit the wall was Lancaster's Sam Lavender, a name that consistently comes up when discussing Roses climbing performances, and he reminded us today why. Sam commands the entire room while he climbs, his confidence is clear and has the whole room cheering for him, creating quite the show

while he is belayed down. He put up an astonishing performance in both his climbs, flashing both with precision and strength. A worthy winner of today's lead competition, keeping his title from last year, Sam certainly remains a force for Lancaster.

Lancaster ended up taking the win of Lead Open Individual, and the final rankings came out at Theo in 4th, Tom in 3rd, Matty in 2nd and Sam taking 1st. This tough competition in lead should have everyone waiting in anticipation for tomorrow's bouldering fixtures!

Both teams walked out to applause from the gathered support, both the pitch and the sidelines having become treacherously muddy over the course of a long day of sport and rain.

Lancaster won the toss, but it was York who started sharper. This sharpness paid off just six minutes into the tie when they won a free kick about 30 yards from goal; centre back Megan Officer stepped up with the crowd expecting her to whip a long ball into the box, but she had other ideas... she took the Lancaster goalkeeper by surprise, striking the ball firmly and looping it over her head to get York off to a perfect start with a spectacular finish

A period of Lancaster pressure followed, before the game began to settle slightly. York threatened more, keeping possession and working the ball patiently, but Lancaster's defence held firm, forcing a number of speculative long shots.

Much of the first half played out in a similar manner, with defences on top for both teams and mud slightly disrupting the passage of the ball; York threatened from a number of other set pieces but couldn't replicate the magic of their early goal.

The defensive nature of the game also meant there were a huge amount of very tough tackles flying in, with fouls conceded left and right by both sides, and sections of a firmly Lancaster crowd cheering

Lancaster started the second half strongly, pressing York possession hard and working the ball quickly but purposefully when they won it back. Yet for all Lancaster's pressure, it was York who were able to break the stalemate once more in the 60th minute, again from a set piece. A long ball came in from a free kick on the halfway line, which then bounced out to midfielder Eleanor Bland who struck a sweet half volley from about 25 yards out to ripple the back of the net once more and place York firmly in the driving seat of the fixture.

Lancaster pressed hard to get back in the game for the rest of the match, but York's defence was staunch, they sat deeper, opting to leave a single player up and work the ball to her when they won it back, but often they opted simply to clear it. Any stoppages in play were used as opportunities to YORK 2

Most prominent was the intense booing faced by York officials at Sunday evening's closing ceremony, which was described by YUSU Sabbatical Officers Pierrick Roger and Hannah Nimmo as "not very sportsmanlike."

Capacity Confusion

Finding space for the hugely popular matches that dominate Roses is no easy task, and this year was no different. Over the weekend the Lancaster organisers faced consistent issues with capacity in the modern, but narrow, Lancaster Sport Centre, Friday night's opening ceremony started almost an hour late due to the slow manner with which the long line of ticket holders entered the hall, with each barcode needing to be scanned. Security faced many discussions with fans attempting to enter via the VIP entrance, which needed to remain unobstructed for entry by VIPs, event staff and student me-

On Saturday the issues escalated. With strict health and safety regulations limiting the capacity of rooms like the swimming pool which became known for its exceptional claustrophobia and heat in 2022 - security was present to limit entry. The men and women's basketball finals on Saturday evening saw lines around the building, with many audience members shocked that they were having to save seats over 45 minutes before fixtures started in order to see their friends play. Also problematic was Lancaster Security's failure to account for student media and event staff, who often needed unvetted and flexible access to venues. York Vision struggled to get verified 'Priority Access' reporters into the swimming pool on multiple occasions because security had ignored pre-organised crew lists and overfilled spaces with audience members.

The television and radio crews faced similar issues when

they were required to swap out camera operators for tech assistants to fix malfunctions, disrupting the live streams of the competitions. In the face of these ongoing issues, LUSU event staff organised an emergency debrief with security teams ahead of the final day, to ensure that capacity for events would henceforth remain 5 less to ensure flexibility for staff first aid and student media where necessary. Even still the hostility and confusion presented by security teams throughout the weekend sometimes put a damper on what should have been a fluid and enjoyable weekend for organisers, media, and audiences

A spokesperson of Lancaster Student union shared, "Security staff at the venues had to work to strict capacity limits for spectators in the interests of health and safety and there were some events where there were more spectators than the venue could accommodate. The student media from Lancaster and York did an excellent job of showing as much of the competition on big screens as possible, to help more people see these events.

"As far as media access is concerned LUSU had dedicated staff looking after media and we are pleased any access issues for them were resolved promptly."

Overall the capacity issues were resolved quickly, and we were very glad for the support that LUSU provided throughout the weekend. It is because of the swift work of staff and security that the weekend remained a safe environment for all participants.

Swimming

The pool was packed to capacity for the swimming, with people watching from every window to see the York and Lancaster swimmers battle it out. Lancaster drew to the lead, but most races only contained a couple of seconds between the swimmers' time.

The races consisted of two races at once, of the universities' A and B teams. Most races contained an A1, A2 and B1 swimmer, with some having B2 as well.

Lancaster pulled into the lead for the 100m individual medley womens' with their A1 team, whilst the 100m was neck on neck with Lancaster B pulling forward, but lancaster A1 ultimately having the fastest time.

The races continued to have Lancaster wins, particularly coming out on top in the open 100m breaststroke with wins across their A1, A2 and B1 swimmers in the open.

York won the women's 100m butterfly, with the York A1 swim-

ming pulling to the lead with a time of 1:03:46, with Lancaster coming in a second behind.

Swimmers continued to propel themselves through the water for the 100m, going into the 200m with many Lancaster wins. The open 200m freestyle was a closer race, with the Lancaster A1 and A2 and York A1 neck on neck. Lancaster A2 seemed to be the speediest swimmer, but ultimately the Lancaster A1 swimmer Toby Lowe gained the quickest time, with only .36 seconds between the Lancaster and York A1 swimmers. York won the B1 race, with a difference between swimmers.

The 50m freestyles were particularly speedy with Lancaster A1 swimmer Amelia Hardy achieving a time of 24.34 seconds in the women's race. The open swimmers were more neck on neck at first, after slashing the crowd with their powerful dives, but ultimately A1 Lancaster swimmer Toby Lowe pulled

to the front to win the race.

For the final two races, the women's 4X50m freestyle, and open 4x50m freestyle, the (mostly) red-clad crowd was electric. During the women's 4X50m, Lancaster A1 team pulled into the lead, gaining a final time of 1 minutes 51 seconds, a full four seconds ahead of York's A1

The open 4X50m freestyle saw the Lancaster A1 team storm away, gaining an almost 10m gap on York. The race went to Lancaster, with a 5 second lead on York's A1 team.

Both teams achieved impressive times, with Lancaster swimmer Olivia Sykes commenting she had achieved her personal best on one race. She mentioned the spectators, saying that it was "a really nice environment, really supportive". This environment and support ultimately led to a Lancaster win across the different categories, coming to an aggregate score in Swimming as a whole as 256-151.

Win for York in Inaugural Esports

Safely inside from the rainy day, esports (competitive video games) held a three game competition. In prior years, esports was held online due to logistics of transporting computers between universities. However, this year the National Student Esports (NSE) stepped in to provide the set-ups needed.

Tech issues marred the start of the League of Legends fixture, as problems caused the display of the game to the crowd to be delayed by over five minutes. Once we were able to get eyes on the game, it wasn't an easy watch for York fans. Lancaster started out with an early domination, decimating the York side. A strong showing from Lancaster's Harazashi ensured York would have a tough time getting into the game, largely off the back of a flurry of multi-kills. The York side were outclassed at every turn and with no sign of relenting, Lancaster pushed York back to their Nexus. Lancaster would put the final nail in the coffin as Ghostface feasts on their opponents, getting an ace and finishing the game. After a netball win, we received reports that crowds in both Netball and Darts were already claiming a Lancaster victory, despite the Roses Live website only displaying 171.5.

Whether this is because LUSU was yet to confirm the results, delayed on updating the netball score or because the calculations did not yet equal a Lanc win, remains up for debate.

What is certain is that student media were ready and waiting with pre-recs, radio commentators, and breaking news articles on standby. So it was off to the pub, or the darts match, to await the final confirmation. During the final for Darts Roses Live was updated with a Lancaster win, giving the home uni the extra point needed to pass the threshold and win Roses, their third win in a row.

The question remains... is there a reason Lancaster continues to win Roses on the Saturday night, a full 24 hours before the end of the competition? Does this continually early win disadvantage and disenfranchise teams playing on Sunday? Does the scheduling need reevaluating? Is the scoring across the first two days disproportionate? If so, the only way to break this pattern of late night announcements might be to reevaluate how the Roses tournament is layed out entirely.

SUNDAY 5 MAY



This was a game with a lot on the line, with a draw in the thirds and a home side victory in the seconds, Lancaster were looking to go unbeaten in women's rugby. The honours went to York as the 1sts Women rugby team held onto a 5-17 victory and gave York's last four-pointer of the Roses weekend. The teams ran onto the pitch engulfed in a haze of red and white spoke.

The women's game was a cagey affair, a lot of scrums and a lot of play being kept in the forwards. York went into the game with a tactic to run around Lancaster, pop passes by the forwards and attempts by the vice-captain Sophie Bates and the captain Hollie O'Sullivan were constantly looking to offload the ball out of the tackle. It was a tactic that Lancaster was accustomed to well and defended really well throughout the entire first half. However, the forwards led by the imperious Katie Jackson at openside and the energetic and wriggly number 8 Charlie Norris and controlled super effectively by scrumhalf Elena Pomarol and Bates at fly half were able to get over the gainline in the first half. In the 16th minute, off a scrum, York went on the attack and a cross field kick from Bates caused havoc for the covering Lancastrian defenders, and the away supporters thought that outside centre Charlie Wooley dotted down but an infringement in the process meant Lancaster were left off the hook.

Exceptional cover defence kept fullback Bailey McIntosh from crossing the whitewash, but eventually York's pressure would eventually lead to points. A whizzing pass from Bates and O'Sullivan had the power to finish for York's first try of the day. This try was unconverted by Bates and the score was 0-5 to the away side.

Despite attempts by Lancaster through the heavy ball carrying of tighthead prop Tahlia Treble to get back into the game, York enjoyed more possession as the first half wore on and got their second try, and again it was the deadly duo of Bates and O'Sullivan as Bates drew

in the defenders and put her captain in for her second, just to the left of the goalposts. This try was converted by Bates and the first half ended 0-12 to York.

Lancaster looked for an answer as the first half drew to a close. This pressure told with York playing dangerously on their own line. Bates rescued a bobbling ball behind her own tryline to make great yards up the pitch, but was turned over, and that led to York haemorrhaging penalties leading to a team yellow card to captain O'Sullivan. Despite being a player up, Lancaster couldn't capitalise before the halftime whistle, 0-12 to York.

After the start of the second half, Lancaster looked to press advantage with York still a woman down for 7 minutes with O'Sullivan in the bin. Buoyed by the impact of replacement back-rower Isabel Bajamo they were able to get into York's 22. And they finally made it count when forward work, typified by the industrious Casey Cutler at number 4 who dotted the ball over the line for Lancaster's first try of

the game after a series of tight carries to the tryline, however this was unconverted.

York tried to get another score to keep the game at arm's length from Lancaster. Although there was a nasty leg injury to York's No.2 Evie Potter and there was a big break in play before being carried off by two of her teammates. There were a couple of other nasty injuries suffered by York in the second half, and one player had to go to the hospital. We hope all injured are doing okay!

Nevertheless, York did not let the breaks in play for injury stop their momentum. A huge break on the right-hand touchline by McIntosh ultimately did not directly lead to a try but there was plenty of momentum still in York's favour. A knock-on close to Lancaster's own tryline proved a killer, as from the resulting scrum York went in for the kill in the phases. Bates again was the maestro, this time it was the other centre Charlie Wooley, denied in the first half, who was on the end of Bates' pass, burrowing

her way over the tryline for York's third try on the 65th minute.

The rest of the second half Lancaster sought to score a try that would see them back in the game but didn't quite have the forward power and composure to match that of York's. York also tried to get another try that would kill the game for good. A ridiculous, Instagram-reel worthy backdoor offload from O'Sullivan led to great interplay down the left-hand touchline but York were unable to capitalise. In the end, York were content keeping Lancaster at arm's length for the rest of the game, and it finished 5-17 to York.

A great game of rugby in front of a noisy spectator's crowd was not quite the attacking try-fest that the warm conditions could have encouraged but was full of physicality and two teams of a high BUCS standard fighting for everything, particularly in the forwards. For anyone questioning the title, yes, Debate is also a competitive sport at the Roses, and for full 4 points! And rightfully so, as it requires a complete mastery in the art of persuasion to best any opponent.

Imagine the first motion: 'Relativism is the belief that knowledge, truth and morality exist in relation to culture, society, or historical context and are not absolute. THP a world in which everyone holds this belief.' Does it sound like a sport to you already?

In this competition, two motion

types were introduced: THP (This House Prefers) and THBT (This House Believes That). Contestants are given time to prepare after motion announcements, adhering to strict rules like no colluding or internet use. While up to three motions were prepared, if one team secures victories in the first two, further rounds are unnecessary, just as it happened in our case.

During debates, members of the house (anyone included in the Debate) representing various sides, take turns delivering speeches, with interruptions allowed by raising hands to make a point. Both teams are competing simultaneously, but there is strong emphasis on individual performance.

We asked the judges about the judging criteria. It encompasses believability, impacting, analysis, and argument weighing. Ulike American debating, where you style, this kind of debating is concerned rather with substance, your analysis and linking of arguments, than style. As noted, rhetoric might be enjoyable, but it's the solidity of argumentation that secures victories.

Debating may appear quite terrifying from the outside, but it is not impossible to start at all! "You can compete right away, I feel like, generally, the debating community in the UK but also in Europe and worldwide, is really welcoming. I started 3 years ago and my first competition just felt like a community already, like something where you really can build that community straight away, and also kind of get good at it as you go."

There is even no requirement for being encyclopaedic in such fields. "Judges expect you to act like an 'Average Global Citizen' - someone who is generally informed but doesn't know all the details of dif-

MMA Cancelled

York's MMA club were left furious after the Brazilian Jiu Jitsu Open fixture on Sunday against Lancaster was cancelled for safety reasons. The home university had failed to organise medical coverage for the event.

Further fury was caused when the Lancaster Uni Brazilian Jiu Jitsu posted on their Instagram story that "York have pulled out", which suggested that York were at fault for the fixture not going ahead. The York MMA club spokesperson told Vision, "The audacity to post a story saying we 'pulled out' as if we're [at fault] is also disgusting."

A representative of Lancaster SU commented, "We can only apologise to the York team and assure them we are investigating why this happened."

Men's 1st Rugby

Over 130 fixtures over the weekend, lots of match reporting, photos, and not so much sleep all came down to the final fixture of the day outside (with Netball Seconds having the honour of finishing the indoor day action). There was not anything points wise to play for, Lancaster already had a hefty deficit over York by the time the men's rugby teams took to the main pitch in front of a packed out crowd, but there was still plenty to play for.

One of the bright notes of an otherwise disastrous home Roses for York in 2023 was the complete whitewash in rugby union in both the men's and women's. This was a sour note that Lancaster wanted desperately to correct and York just as desperately wanted to hold onto. This meant the match was certainly cagey in the first quarter, as Lancaster enjoyed more possession. Lineout inaccuracy and a wobbly scrum, which just couldn't handle the 6 foot 7 frame of Watkin (double check name), meant York were unable to string together a considerable number of phases. Lancaster on the other hand, was very clinical and despite York keeping the maul at bay, and the tighthead prop was just not going to be stopped from five metres out,

which was duly converted by fly-half [name]. Just three minutes later, from another rolling maul, the flyhalf whizzed the ball outside to number 15 [name] who dummied and dotted the ball down under the sticks. [Flyhalf] easily converted at Lancaster had got to a quick 14-0 lead to jubilation from the home support and rowdy 'ultras' (players from Lancaster's seconds and thirds) on the other side of the pitch.

However, Lancastrian complacency let York back into the game in the first half. Lancaster were not going to let momentum slide, and a rolling maul from five metres out gave [tighthead prop] his second try of the game, and it was converted for a 21-7 lead.

The lineout, which had been stuttering for York, had finally started to click, and for the first time in the game they were able to pull together some phases. Despite Lancastrian attempts to cause mayhem at the breakdown, Captain No.8 Dylan Jamni (who led his

team from the front all day and often rescued a reversing scrum with crucial carries) burst his way over the tryline for a converted score at 21-12. Lancaster responded back just as quickly with the fullback powering his way over the line, it suspiciously looked like double movement yet the officials were happy and another conversion set the score at 28-12 and the half-time whistle soon followed with a 16 point mountain for York to climb.

The second half started off with a lot of stop and starts, and not brilliant rugby from either side. Even with a yellow card to Lancaster's Cypriot international (yes this is apparently true) for starting a scrap. York were never able to make the extra man count and were guilty of overplaying on the halfway line in a desperate attempt to exploit the one man advantage.

As soon as [player's] sin-bin finished Lancaster went into fourth gear and York never got another sniff in the game. York had an opportunity to get a third try but a loose ball and a pick-up from Lancaster meant they marched up the field and never looked back. With the pressure building, an inside ball from replacement scrumhalf and York's defence parted like the

Red Sea as the fullback Cook went over for his second. This was the opening of the floodgates in the last five minutes. York's flyhalf Chesworth tried a speculative up-andunder that was calmly collected by Lancaster's left wing Dan Hope. Instead of calling for the mark, he neatly slipped the ball out to no.21 on the wrap-around and Lancaster burst up the field again. A few phases later and no.22 barnstormed his way over the line for a converted score. By this point, York were completely out on their feet and Lancaster's flyhalf danced inside a tired forward to make a break down the middle and made a pearl of pass to Dan Hope on the wing to score.

York were unable to get any consolation scores in the final plays of the game and the match finished 47-12 as the victorious players were swamped by red-flares and Lancastrian pitch invaders. Throughout the game, York suffered from a dysfunctional set piece in the lineout and being destroyed in the scrum and had no platform to counter Lancaster with and the home side were able to finish Roses with a rout of their own in the rugby.

When play resumed after a break between quarters, the intensity of play continued, with York levelling the scores before taking a swift lead. The two sides retreated to the sidelines for half time with York leading 3-5, showcasing a dominant end to the second quarter spearheaded by Lara Dalton.

York continued to assert their dominance deep into the third quarter, with Katie Hewetson scoring a well worked team goal to extend the lead to 3-7. This lead would extend by two more points before Lancaster could respond, by this point the game was already gone. Although York's offence outclassed Lancaster's, it was in the defence that York particularly looked superior, with goal keeper Kathryn Halstead making some crucial stops to prevent Lancaster's fight back.

It took a moment of individual brilliance, turning out to be undoubtedly the goal of the match, to restore Lancaster's confidence in front of the net, with centre Mathilde Birch intercepting the ball at the halfway line, beating a number of players, all before sliding the ball into the back of the net. Vision spoke to York Sport Union President Tanisha Jain (TJ) after the final Roses fixture ended in a tough day at the office for York Men's 1st Rugby team to get her concluding thoughts on the Roses weekend, where York lost by 217.5-126.6. TJ's voice was hoarse from three days of shouting from the sidelines but was still more than happy to give Vision an interview as everyone packed up to go home.

What are your concluding thoughts on the weekend, it's been long, it's been tough, everyone is either ready to go out or go home, can you give a

summary of your thoughts on Roses 2024 for Vision?

"I mean it's been a great weekend of sport, I think that's what Roses is about, about competition, about bringing two universities together. It's been a great weekend, I am very tired. Disappointing loss for the men's rugby but I'm very hopeful for next year I'm gonna turn it around and hopefully next year Roses will be white."

We can't beat around the bush, it is the third Roses defeat in a row, what needs to be done next year to really change things around? "I'm not going to lie, I think we've just been [too] nice, at Sport at York we're about being nice, we've got everyone to feel included, I agree with that, we need everyone to be included. [But] it's also about competition, things like Roses we need to instil the fire back into York. [Roses] is the most important [sporting] event of the year. The fact that this is the biggest Varsity in Europe, we have to take it more seriously than what we have done currently."

TJ's comments will be met with agreeing nods from a lot of the University's sports teams. There is definitely a sense that whilst at too many

occasions behaviour was over the line, Lancaster created an intimidating atmosphere. At times you just cannot deal with that pressure, especially as Roses is the only time that a lot of our university teams will be playing in front of large crowds this year. Nonetheless, there is a lot more that needs to be done, and not just short-term planning but also in the long term as well. The gap in funding between the two Universities for sport is simply too big at the moment. If York is to win a Roses in the foreseeable future then simply put the University of York needs to start caring about its sports teams. We

can make home Roses as hostile as we like, but playing Europe's biggest intervarsity event on a public recreational ground and not having full access to the York Sports Village are just two obstacles which will make Lancaster's advantage unobtainable for some years to come. But perhaps TJ's comments are right, Iif we start to make our crowds hostile, and get more York students to care about Roses, that might be the push that's needed for some genuine investment to go into our sports teams.

Banner-Making, Nightline and Eco Swap

Amongst all the action and rivalry at Roses, three Lancaster student groups pitched their society to the crowds that came and went throughout the weekend.

The first I visited was CraftS-oc, run by Sof and Sofia, who approached LUSU (YUSU's equivalent in Lancaster) as they were looking for students to contribute to the competition's atmosphere. Usually, they run biweekly craft events like painting and crocheting, but in true spirit of the Roses rivalry, they set up a stall with cardboard, stencils and marker pens for fans to make banners and signs to support their team.

Sofia added, "they don't mind that we only have red pens."

Some volunteers explained that it was really important for everyone to feel supported at Roses, with emotions running high and a busy environment for everyone. This stands in the context of York's own Nightline service beclosed down last year after YUSU chose not to re-ratify the project following substantial concerns relating to the practical and emotional impact of it on both it's volunteers and York Nightline's users"

Finally, there was the Eco Swap Shop, which was a stand that

allowed students to donate clothes and swap them for something else. Students could also buy second-hand items if they didn't have anything to give for a small charge starting at £1. Asha and Muneebah, who were running the stall, said that they had been very busy, particularly on Friday, and that they were glad they had stopped clothes going to waste.

A Taster of Powerlifting...

Being first-timers to watching powerlifting, the initial scoring system provided some much-needed context for us.

Each athlete is sorted into their weight category. Each athlete does nine different lifts: three squats, three benches, and three deadlifts. Each successful lift is added to the total score, and there will be a total overall winner relative to the lifter's weight and the weight they managed to lift. A person stands behind them, and then two people are on either side, watching the weights. If anyone starts to lift slanted or unevenly, the watcher steps in.

Despite being an individual sport, the atmosphere from both competitions and the crowd felt communal, with cheering and celebration coming from the crowd.

The women competitors go first. They can all do the first lift well, even though some approach the bar nervously before attempting it. Some tremble around their mouths; others go red in the face. Some squat slowly and measuredly; while others do it quickly. Everyone reacts differently under the pressure.

Often, getting down into the

squat is the easy bit. It's during the coming-up part that the atmosphere becomes tense. The crowd watches as their legs tremble, and they take a final deep breath.

As the weights get heavier, some of the competitors begin to struggle, even though they still seem to maintain composure for their holds and squats.

There are many ways that a squat can be unsuccessful. For example, it's a no-lift if the person starts to squat before the watcher yells 'squat' because part of the challenge is to hold the weight before squatting. It is also deemed unsuccessful if the squat isn't deep enough.

Despite the red and white branded across campus which allows for clearly distinguishable loyalties, the use of red and white flags in powerlifting continued to baffle us, as they neither seemed to represent the University of the competitors nor whether their lifts were successful.
